VANCOUVER NATIONAL 2000

Nearly 3400 dancers gathered this summer in Vancouver for an excellent convention. Canada Place is still a spectacular place to dance with its white sails overhead and cruise ships docking alongside every day. Although the number of dancers was less than half of the 7000 strong crowd of 1990, the organization was much better and all went smoothly.

Twelve halls were programmed to allow full time dancing at the Mainstream, Plus, A-1, A-2, and C-1 square dance programs, two Round Dance Halls and one Clogging hall with part time halls for a second Clogging hall, Wheelchairs, Contras, C-2 and C-3A. In addition there were 3 small rooms dedicated to seminars on Sewing, General Interest and Caller & Cuer Topics.

They had a new solution to the wood floor problem using tongue and groove plywood with strong tape that was very satisfactory. The biggest advantage to the floor was that no nail or screw holes were necessary so the resale value was nearly the same as the cost.

NATIONAL CONVENTION 2002 IN SAINT JOHN, NEW BRUNSWICK

Four squares of dancers in the New Brunswick outfit performed the two specially choreographed dances inviting observers to "come on down" to the land of covered bridges, ocean breezes, and fiddleheads. This presentation was very well received and the 2002 registration desk was constantly busy. Saint John now has over 1200 dancers registered for the 2002 National including an impressive list of national and international callers and cuers. A callers and cuers school is being planned to precede the convention as we did in Halifax in '94. More information will be coming and many helping hands will be needed.

CWDIA REPORT

The Canadian Western Dance Instructors Association met in Vancouver. The SOCAN issue has reached as satisfactory a state as can reasonably be expected. Both tariff 19 (personal license for leaders) and tariff 8 (special dance license) are legally on the books and supposed to be obeyed. The question of what constitutes a "Special Dance" is still a bit vague and being interpreted differently across the country. Organizers of major events should make sure that they obtain the proper license. The Cross-Border Issue is on hold until other Canada-US issues are resolved. The committee to write guidelines designed to assist in programming a national convention has completed its work and the guidelines are available.

With no new pressing issues, it was decided to make the Association dormant until a new need arises. The Canadian Advisory Committee in Callerlab continues to function.

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WORKSHEET ON NORMALIZING AND PAIRING DANCERS WHEN SIGHT CALLING

For each of the following diagrams, find a short series of moves that will a) make normal couples or same-sex centre waves, b) pair at least one couple and c) resolve. You may find it easier to pair first and then normalize and it is possible to resolve without pairing. Aim for ten moves or less using the Basic Program and six moves or less using the Mainstream Program.

Also consider the moves usefulness as a means of normalizing a square (does it help create normal couples with gent on left and lady on right?).
