NEWS FROM THE FEDERATION

The Winter meeting of the Federation Board was held in Melvern Square on 27 January. The main items were:

- The Director of Dance NS, Dianne Milligan, made a presentation regarding the annual International Dance Day always held on 29 April. Details are shown further on in this newsletter.

- Acting Secretary, Dottie Welch, issued updated editions of both the By-laws & Executive Guidebook.

- It was noted with concern, that the Federation still needs a **Secretary**, **Publicity Officer**, & **DANS rep**resentative. As well, the Finance committee needs two members.

- It was decided to again publish the **Summer Brochure** to be placed in tourism locations for visiting dancers. Dottie Welch volunteered to collect the information. Clubs/Callers/Cuers should send it to her by **1 April**.

- The Board again decided to take part in the **50+ EXPO** at the Halifax Exhibition Grounds on **8&9 June**. Bob Ruohoniemi volunteered to chair this project. In order to have suitable information in handouts, he needs the contact names/info and dates/times for clubs' **Open Houses** if they will be accepting New Dancers by, **1 May**.

- The NS Canadian Society Directors, Bob & Inge Ruohoniemi reported that there were 33 clubs and over 700 dancers registered in the Federation. The decline in numbers of dancers is also a national trend. The Society will take special recognition of those dancers who have attended every National Convention including 2008 in London, Ontario, which is the 30th anniversary of the CSRDS.

- The Acting DANS rep., Inge Ruohoniemi, noted that all clubs can receive administrative support from Dance NS Nova Scotia (DANS) with photocopying in both black and colour, & glossy at very low rates. INTERNATIONAL DANCE DAY

Background

In 1982 the International Dance Committee of the International Theatre Institute (ITI UNESCO) founded International Dance Day to be celebrated every year on the 29th of April. The date commemorates the birthday of Jean-Georges Noverre, who was born in 1727 and was a great reformer of dance. Every year a message from a well known dance personality is circulated throughout the world. The intention of International Dance Day and the Message is to bring all dance together on this day, to celebrate this art form and revel in its universality, to cross all political, cultural and ethnic barriers and bring people together in peace and friendship with a common language – Dance.

Dance Nova Scotia is part of a national effort to use International Dance Day to help raise public awareness of dance and the benefits that it brings to individuals and communities. We are encouraging our members to undertake projects that highlight the theme and involve the general public. Since this year's theme is children, one project idea is to partner with a church or community group to hold a family dance on a the Sunday afternoon.

Dance Nova Scotia will help groups and organizations to wish to participate, by providing posters, flyers, media releases and public service announcements. DANS will also contact local recreation directors to let them know about the day and the projects that are happening in their communities.

<u>We Remember</u>: Basil Griffin who passed away December 8, 2006, in his 88th year, in Burlington Ontario.He was the caller for Hightide Twirlers 1982 to 1988. The following is taken from an article written by Marion Atkinson and printed in Between Tips February 1989. (Square Dance Archives)

"A Fond Farewell to the Griff-Inns.

The "Griff-Inn" is up for sale, (may already be sold), their square dance shoes will be cooling off and as of their 6^{th} graduation this past May, Madeleine and Basil's mic will be hung up for a time. The Griffins will head south to Arizona in the fall for sun and fun. They will take with them the love and best wishes of all their friends and fellow square and round dancers everywhere.

Six years may not seem very long in the role of teacher but Basil did not take up the calling aspect of the activity until his retirement from the work force. Up until then Madeleine (affectionately known by the dancers as "Maddie") lived in Burlington, Ontario and danced with clubs in Burlington and Toronto. They were members of the National Campers Association and traveled and danced extensively in Canada, USA and Hawaii. They were off every weekend from May to November. Basil attended one summer of caller school with the Toronto District Square Dance Callers School.

In May of 1979 the Griffins left Ontario for Basil's hometown of Kentville. There to settle down and enjoy their retirement. No rocking chair for this vibrant couple. Besides their home in Kentville, they acquired 30 acres of woodland in Black Rock and there established the "Griff-Inn".

That same summer Maddie and Basil went further down the valley to the House of Roth to attend Gloria's Caller School. They returned for a second year and in the meantime joined the Haley Dancers Club. Their friendly manner and willingness to please soon made them a big plus to the Haley Dancers. Maddie, who is able to turn her hand to anything, took on many club projects.

The Griffins also attended DANS Caller School at Acadia University in 1981,'82 and '83. They were also involved in Federation roles.

In the fall of '82 they started a class of 8 couples in Avonport. From there the Hightide Twirlers has grown to a club of 53 couples. They were also members of the K & M Valley Rounds and remained members of the Haley Dancers. They were also active members of MCCA.

With Maddie and Basil you are never a stranger for long. Fun and friendliness is the name of the game. Once the weather allows the Griff-Inn is a busy spot with square dancers from all clubs in the area being invited up for fun, food and games. Their evening campfires are something to be remembered. If anyone in the area has troubles or illness the Griffins are the first at your door to offer help and comfort. They are never too busy to lend a helping hand. Their club will certainly miss this attention but wish only the best for this couple. We all wish them well in the future, hoping their warm winters will keep them in good health. When they return to Nova Scotia, we hope to square up with them again."

The proposed individual must be recommended by at least three people who are members of groups within the DANS organization. In making recommendations, the fullest possible information must accompany the application, including but not limited to: a resume of the nominee, photocopies of newspaper/magazine/ newsletter articles, photos, statements by individuals both in and outside of the dance communityattesting to the contribution of the nominee.

Submissions should be submitted through Federation Regional Representatives to the Federation President.
