On October 3, 2006, Judy Campbell and Carolyn Mont were delighted to represent the Friends of McNabs Island Society at the closing banquet of the 2006 Annual General Meeting of the Canadian Council on Ecological Areas (CCEA). They were there to accept, on behalf of the Friends, CCEA's prestigious Gold Leaf Award. The CCEA is a national non-profit organization whose mission is to facilitate and assist Canadians with the establishment and management of a comprehensive network of protected areas representative of

Canada's interested and aquatic ecological natural diversity. This year CCEA held their 2006 Annual General Meeting at Oak Island Inn and Resort in Western Shore, NS.

The Gold Leaf Award acknowledges contributions of individuals, organizations and agencies to the CCEA mission. The Friends of McNabs Island Society was presented this award in recognition of years of dedication to the preservation of McNabs Island. McNabs and Lawlor Islands Park Advisory Committee Updates

In the near future, the Department of Natural Resources plans to remove and replace Range Pier located on the Eastern Passage side of McNabs Island. O'Halloran Campbell Consultants has been hired to develop an engineering plan for a new pier to be located beside the existing pier. The old dilapidated Range Pier will be dismantled and removed before spring. Hopefully funding for a new wharf will be in next year's DNR budget.

Despite opposition from many members of the Park Advisory Committee, DNR plans to restrict camping to just the ten campsites near the Teahouse for the 2007 season. Many visitors to the island have complained that this site is not easily accessible from the Back Cove area which is the most popular disembarkation point on the island. DNR has agreed to look at more than one location once a permanent site for the campground is chosen.

DNR is constructing a new maintenance building beside the caretaker's house on the island. This building will replace the existing sheds on the property.

Since DNR is responsible for the care and upkeep of historic Fort Ives, the Department has established a Fort Ives Technical Working Group. This group of experts from various government departments will assess the condition of Fort Ives and recommend any stabilization work that needs to be done to maintain the historic integrity of the 19th century fortification. by Cathy McCarthy

After 23 years as DNR's full-time caretaker on McNabs Island, Dave Seaboyer is planning to retire this winter. Dave has been a watchful eye to the "goings-on" on the island over the years and has diligently protected the historic Conrad and Lynch houses. He has been an immense help to the Friends of McNabs Island, especially during our beach cleanups where he assisted in hauling garbage and recyclables to the wharf for pickup. It is hoped that the Department will fill Dave's position immediately so that the island's historic assets are not jeopardized.
